(In certain circumstances, where completion of an action research project is not feasible, participants will be able to submit a portfolio of professional practice, including a plan for future professional development as an alternative)

8. Intended Learning Outcomes of Course:

By the end of the course successful students will be able to:

1. critically analyse and discuss research literature on a specified topic in learning & teaching of the creative practices;
2. evaluate and apply feedback from students, mentors and others to critically analyse past and present educational practice to demonstrate how the programme's learning outcomes have been met.
3. Demonstrate a set of core professional values appropriate to their role and function.

Participants who choose to complete an action research project report will be able to:

1. demonstrate an understanding of the methodological principles underpinning action research and reflective practice;
2. plan, develop and complete an independent action research project;
3. demonstrate familiarity with research ethics.
4. critically analyse and discuss findings from action research and develop a plan for further development.

Participants who complete a portfolio will be able to:

1. evaluate and apply concepts and theories of learning & teaching to past and present educational practice to demonstrate how the programme's learning outcomes have been met

10. Description of Summative Assessment:

Participants will be assessed by:

A 4000-5000 word project report on an agreed action research project.

(Where a 4000-5000 word portfolio is submitted in place of an action research project, it will, provide evidence, through case studies of the participant's practice and a critical evaluation of that practice, how the participant has met the learning outcomes of the Postgraduate Certificate in Learning & Teaching (Creative Practices). The choice of project submission (report or portfolio) will have to be agreed with the programme co-ordinator by the start of Course 2.)

10.1 Please describe the Summative Assessment arrangements:

Participants submit work electronically, although it is possible to make alternative arrangements if other formats or modes, such as presentations, are agreed. A representative sample of work is second marked, and participants are provided with detailed feedback, mapped against the assessment criteria

Formative feedback provided on draft elements of the project report/portfolio.
